Jesse Colvin Reports Stunning 3rd Quarter Fundraising Numbers

Perry Hall, MD – Maryland's 1st Congressional District candidate Jesse Colvin announced a stunning 3rd Quarter fundraising haul of \$883,106 on Monday, following the filing of [his campaign's Federal Election Commission \(FEC\) report](#) for the period.

The report indicates that Colvin has surpassed expectations in his ability to close the financial gap with his opponent, who entered the race with a significant head start in cash on hand. **Colvin's exceptional performance in Q3 suggests [the competition in Maryland's 1st District](#) has narrowed.**

The Colvin campaign has raised **over \$1.5 million to date**. In previous financial quarter reports, Colvin's high watermark was about \$250K. The goal set for this quarter was initially \$500K.

Of the contributions received by the Colvin campaign in Q3, just over **84%** came from donors **inside Maryland**. Over **61%** of all contributions were **small contributions**.

Below is Jesse Colvin's statement on the subject:

"When my wife and I started this campaign, it was just the two of us delivering meet and greet invitations in the snow. She was about seven months pregnant. We have since built an army of over 1,500 volunteers and sparked a movement for change in Maryland's 1st District. We're humbled to report we have far surpassed even our most hopeful expectations for fundraising this quarter. And we're proud that support came from individual contributors, folks mostly inside the state of Maryland. Unlike the incumbent, we don't want and don't need money from corporate PACs and special interest groups. This was never going to be easy, but if we knock enough doors and raise enough money — we win. We are incredibly grateful for the support and generosity of so many. Now we just have to buckle down and take it over the finish line."
